**Battleground New Jersey** Nelson Johnson, 2014-12-05 New Jersey's legal system was plagued with injustices from the time the system was established through the mid-twentieth century. In *Battleground New Jersey*, historian and author of *Boardwalk Empire*, Nelson Johnson chronicles reforms to the system through the dramatic stories of Arthur T. Vanderbilt—the first chief justice of the state's modern-era Supreme Court—and Frank Hague—legendary mayor of Jersey City. They were different ethnically, culturally, and temperamentally, but they shared the goals of power. Relying upon previously unexamined personal files of Vanderbilt, Johnson's engaging chronicle reveals the hatred the lawyer had for the mayor and the lengths Vanderbilt went to in an effort to destroy Hague. *Battleground New Jersey* illustrates the difficulty in adapting government to a changing world, and the vital role of independent courts in American society.
