The Access to Coverage and Care Project, 2009 In 2004, the City of New York's Human Resource Administration's Office of Citywide Health Insurance Access (OCHIA) developed a demonstration project in order to better address how to both decrease the number of uninsured children and improve continuity of coverage for those already enrolled in public health insurance. Partnering with researchers from New York University School of Medicine and New York City's Office of School Health, OCHIA matched records from student registers in 23 target schools in East Harlem and Bushwick against administrative files for Medicaid and Child Health Plus (CHP). Data matches were conducted every four months between June 2004 and June 2006. During the two school years studied, 200,435 children were enrolled in the 23 schools.

Care Without Coverage examines the real consequences for adults who lack health insurance. The study presents findings in the areas of prevention and screening, cancer, chronic illness, hospital-based care, and general health status. The committee looked at the consequences of being uninsured for people suffering from cancer, diabetes, HIV infection and AIDS, heart and kidney disease, mental illness, traumatic injuries, and heart attacks. It focused on the roughly 30 million-one in seven-working-age Americans without health insurance. This group does not include the population over 65 that is covered

by Medicare or the nearly 10 million children who are uninsured in this country. The main findings of the report are that working-age Americans without health insurance are more likely to receive too little medical care and receive it too late; be sicker and die sooner; and receive poorer care when they are in the hospital, even for acute situations like a motor vehicle crash.
